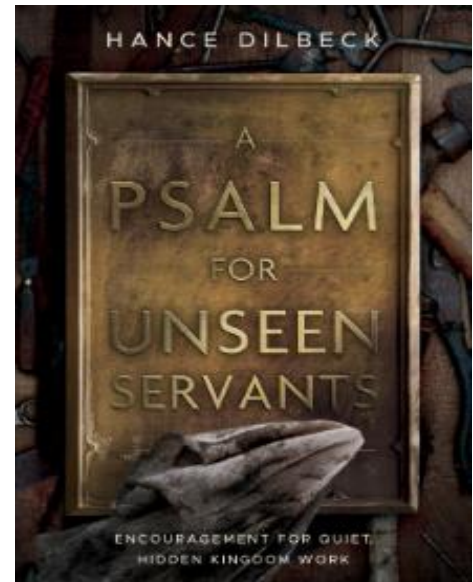


## ‘A Psalm For Unseen Servants’ Honors Sacred Work of Church’s Hidden Heroes
